Subject: Request to Reject Anti-Patent Legislation

## To Members of Congress:

We are writing today to request that you not co-sponsor the pending Goodlatte/Issa Anti-Patent Legislation; and when it comes for a vote, we respectfully request that you <u>vote "No"</u> on this legislation.

The Small Business Technology Council (SBTC) advocates for the 5,000 companies that participate in the Small Business Innovation Research (SBIR) program. These companies produce 25% of America's most important innovations (R&D 100 Awards) and 58% more patents than all the universities combined. Furthermore, it is the small innovative businesses that create about half the jobs in America.

According to the Federal Reserve, patents are the most important indicator of regional wealth. The more patents a region has, the wealthier the region becomes. The proposed Goodlatte/Issa bill will make it more expensive and more difficult to obtain a patent; and it will put enforcing a patent beyond the financial reach of most small inventors. Thus, there will be fewer patents made by America's independent and small corporate inventors. This will make America poorer, and work to kill the American Dream of creating a new invention as the road to wealth; as small inventors will be priced-out of the inventing business.

HR 3309, which passed the House in December 2013, is the basis of the new Goodlatte/Issa bill. This was strongly opposed before by both SBTC, and the much broader National Small Business Association (NSBA). It was also opposed by the Small Business Administration Office of Advocacy.
